The MPO is the first point of contact within our club for any person concerned about the well-being of themselves or other members. The MPO provides confidential, impartial and timely information and support about complaint resolution options that are available to address concerns raised.

Safety on the Water

The atmosphere on the GFS deck on Wednesdays is a testament to how much we all enjoy our twilight sailing. But we cannot take it for granted, as the sad incident in a recent twilight on the harbour demonstrated.

The skipper has ultimate responsibility for safety on their yacht. As skippers we all need to remember that we are sailing for fun not sheep stations and not push so hard that accidents occur.

But crew members are critical too. Two points are important.

First, especially in strong winds, there are three people responsible for steering the yacht; the helm, the crew on the mainsheet and the crew on the genoa. If a boat on port a has to duck a boat on starboard, all three have a role, or the boat cannot bear away. Similarly, if a boat working or reaching is hit by a strong gust all three roles will be critical to avoiding a roundup.

Second, skippers cannot see everything around them. All crew need to keep a watch for other boats and hazards and keep the skipper well informed. All skippers will be grateful to hear about a hazard before it is too late!

Let's keep us all safe and ready to enjoy an evening on the GFS deck! 😩 🔔

Outside Starts

The proposal to hold outside starts stemmed from the results of a survey of members at the end of the previous Twilight Season. Some members wanted an earlier start when the days were short and the winds often light, and others were concerned about congestion as larger yachts overtook smaller ones as they exited Humbug, especially in light winds. Outside starts helped to address all of these issues raised by members.

Another survey was conducted after the first four weeks. It showed that outside starts were well received and many members expressed appreciation for the effort involved. The wind for the first four races was very variable and while this caused issues with some of the races it would have been even more difficult with clubhouse starts and finishes.

The committee has decided that as previously planned, we will use outside starts for the last 4 races of the season when the days are shorter, and winds are likely to be lighter. We have had much helpful feedback from members and will explore several ideas for improvement before the last four races of the season. These include start lines and

courses. Further suggestions very welcome. We will make several modifications to how we run the races and will advise these nearer the time.

Finally, this project took a good deal of organising. My thanks to the Committee for support and Peter Hamilton, James Douglas, DJ Holster, Steve Bradley, the members who drove the start boat, and especially the Starters, Liam and Archie. \Rightarrow

Preparing for the Women's Helm Series

The fourth GFS Women's Helm Series will be held on 15 and 22 January.

This event takes place as part of the usual Twilight race, with the only requirement being that a woman is on the helm. The point score is run simultaneously to the normal Twilight point score. And if you win, you get your name on a trophy!

This is the fourth year of the event and the Club is keen to see more boats participating.

For me, helming in races was very challenging at first. In fact, I still find it challenging but it does get easier and, most nights, it's very rewarding, especially when you're with a friendly bunch of people who are keen to compete and have a great night sailing and socialising.

The first step is simply to have a go. Even if you're nervous, or petrified (!), think about whether you're prepared to give it a try.

Don't be put off if it's tense or hard the first time...like most things, the more experience you have, the better it gets. It helps if you can try helming outside of race conditions if possible. Beforehand, take some time to have a conversation with the usual Skipper to make a plan. Racing is a team sport so aim for a positive, constructive atmosphere on your boat.

It's a good idea to get to know people. Come back to the BBQ, chat to other sailors. Everyone is friendly and keen to help. Although women are in the minority at GFS, especially among Skippers and boat owners, there are plenty of women at the Club and we have our GFS Women Sailors group to provide each other with information, opportunities and support. Don't be afraid to ask a question or seek advice.

If you don't have a regular crew spot, look for opportunities. Chris Gaskell (0432 018 081) often hears from Skippers looking for crew, so introduce yourself to him and see if he can find a place for you. One of the best ways to learn is to sail with different people on various boats. \Rightarrow

Rules Corner Outcomes

Steve Bradley: Vice Commodore

The Rules Corner has been well received with several interesting issues raised. It has been an opportunity for all involved to increase their understanding of the rules and contribute to safer and fairer racing at GFS. Here are a couple of issues that were not clear to those involved at the time and were resolved amicably. If you have an issue you would like to discuss, please do not hesitate to approach the rules corner



on a Wednesday evening after the results have been announced. Also note that national sailing judge Erica Kirby has offered to answer questions from the Club so ask and we'll get an answer for you.

- A. Two boats were tacking up Humbug and the boat closest to shore (Boat A) called for 'Room to Tack'. The other boat (Boat B) immediately tacked away, and Boat A commenced a tack. As Boat A turned through 90 degrees the wind shifted dramatically, and she found she was still on the same tack and able to clear the obstruction. On careful reading of the rules, it became clear that Boat A had infringed. The rules state that after calling for 'Room to Tack' a boat must complete a tack regardless of the angle she has to turn through, completing a significant change in course is not sufficient. The incident was settled with a handshake and a better understanding of the rules by all involved.
- B. Two boats were tacking towards the Red Channel buoy off Goat Island in a NE wind. The boat on Port (Boat A) believed they were approaching a mark and had entered the zone first and had right of way. The boat on Starboard (Boat B) believed that they had rights in a Port /Starboard situation. The panel determined that the Red Channel buoy is not a mark of the course, it is part of a continuing obstruction along with the rest of Goat Island, so mark room does not apply. Even if it had been a mark, the rule for mark room only applies to boats on the same tack so Boat A should still have given way. At the time Boat A had tacked away but was keen to clear up the rules.

YOTS On Yachts 2024

Our popular GFS "tradition" YOTS On Yachts was held on 4 December 2024. This was the 26th year that GFS has Hosted Youth Off the Streets kids and Youth Workers to join us for our twilight race and BBQ afterwards. This year saw 27 teenagers (ages around 14 to 17) and 9 Youth Workers from 4 YOTS schools (from the Central Coast, Wollongong, Merrylands and Macquarie Fields respectively). Conditions for this First Race in the Summer series were a gentle 5-12 knot South East to Eastly breeze, with the course to

Goat Island with a view of the Opera House and Bridge and return through Humbug a relatively short course in (the correct) anticipation of a fading breeze.



This year we were fortunate in that we had a few more boats volunteering to host than we needed to accommodate all the visitors. We even ended up splitting one pair of workers to spread



the visitors around! 17 yachts took between 1 and 3 visitors each, and several other yachts were available, but picking up after loading was completed. Thanks to all skippers and crew who hosted, or were prepared to host, this year. Some boats had even entered the summer series, simply to be present for

YoY-many thanks to those who went this extra mile!

While the relatively gentle conditions suited many of the visitors new to sailing, there are always some who feel nervous for their first experience of sailboat racing on Sydney harbour. The feedback is that crew are always welcoming, reassuring and patient, safety briefings done and flotation jackets offered in case of need. Several boats were able to

involve the kids and workers actively, which when possible is always an extra level of fun for the visitors. One boat was actually short crew this year and was able to work their visitors actively on the winches to great effect, coming in first on handicap in their division!

While we do have some kids and Youth workers who come several years in a row, there are always many new faces. Invariably the skippers and crew have very positive interactions with their new visitors and are very happy to contemplate repeating the experience. While members are sometimes sad that kids will not be repeat visitors, the big positive is that such kids will often be



heading on to new and exciting challenges after their time with YOTS.

As always, the excitement back on the GFS Deck of knowledge is a highlight. This year was no exception with the wind having dropped and conditions very pleasant. While cloudy, the rain stayed away! Catering for an extra 36 meals is always a challenge, but Holly Charalambous' voucher system, including clear instructions, worked a treat. Many thanks to Bern and the catering staff for absorbing the extra demands seamlessly.



The good humour and other pleasant interactions over dinner between kids and staff and members including around the BBQs is great for visitors and members alike. While members routinely have a few drinks, the relaxed atmosphere is reportedly

often commented on by the kids whose experiences where alcohol is present with adults, can often be rowdy or aggressive behaviour.

A highlight of the night for members are the comments from the YOTS leaders including over recent times a Q&A session with some of the kids led by YOTS Ben Cook. The format gives the kids some structure to give some comments on their own situation, their engagement through the YOTS support approach and their personal experience of their night on the water. This public speaking practice is impressive by the kids and the YOTS workers are very proud of those who are given this opportunity and represent themselves and YOTS so well.





Over recent times, it has also become part of the tradition for GFS organisers to put together gift bags for the kids, including gift vouchers and other items suitable for teenage visitors. The GFS members behind the scenes here are Glenda Cameron-Strange, Holly Charalambous, and Maree and Adrian van Bellen. Many thanks for the generosity in time contributed including in sponsor liaison.

The funding for YoY comes from GFS Resources and member donations specifically targeted to the event. This year's donations totalled around \$2100 which will contribute significantly to the costs of the evening. Many thanks to all those members who contributed.

While informal feedback from YOTS kids and Youth Workers is reflected in the above account, an email from John Martin, School Principal of The Lakes College on the Central Coast follows. It includes an account of heartfelt comments from one of his students that sums up why so many on both sides of YOTs on Yachts continue their support of this GFS outreach activity. Again thanks to all involved.

Letter to GFS from John Martin, School Principal, YOTs

Fri, 6 Dec

Hi Chris,

I wanted to thank you and the GFS Committee for organising the logistics of our 2024 YOTS on YACHTS event which was held on Wednesday.

You ensured that our students and staff were welcomed at the club on a stunning Summer evening to race around the harbour and it certainly provided us all with a wonderful experience.

The dinner and dessert afterwards was greatly appreciated and we were all so proud as we listened to Larissa (CDC), Charlie (TLC and CJ (TLC) speak in front of the club members whilst being interviewed by Ben (TLC School Manager).

The club has truly been generous over the years but it must be stated that this year, as crews and captains welcomed us onto their boats, one of our students quietly asked why strangers would be so kind in providing dinner, drinks, boat rides (during a race!), teaching sailing skills, taking time out to spend time with YOTS students, etc all for free. I was able to highlight to her that there are many people in our schools, YOTS and the much wider community who genuinely care about the teens that we support and that what she is seeing is a true example of GENEROSITY, which is something we explore and promote in our organisation.

Tips and Tricks for new Helmspeople

Racing Rules

The racing rules of sailing determine how boats should behave when they meet. This is very important for safety as well as for fair competition. Take the time to read the rules so you have a basic understanding. Racing Rules It is rare for a skipper to have a complete understanding of all the rules and how they apply in all circumstances. It is common to have different opinions about the rules that occur in a particular situation and if in doubt keep clear. Feel free to join the Rules Corner held weekly at the BBQ to explore aspects of the rules that are not clear to you.

Starting

The start line is frequently the most congested and challenging part of the race. Keep your VHF radio tuned to Channel 72 to hear the starters' messages. Feel free to start a little behind your fleet to avoid the busiest time. The divisions start 5 minutes apart so starting 1 minute or so after the start of your division will keep you clear of the next start. Remember to keep clear of the line until just before your starting time.

Avoid Wind Holes

Racing in the waters to the West of the Harbour Bridge provides some delightful moments and some challenging conditions. One of the biggest difficulties is avoiding areas where there is little or no wind. Typically, these areas are on the downwind side of major headlands or islands. You can spot these areas by the water appearing smooth and lighter in colour than the surrounding areas. It is frequently worth sailing a longer distance to avoid going through an area with little or no wind. Humbug is particularly notorious for this and every skipper has a story about how certain victory was lost in Humbug!

Entering Race Series

Finally, a reminder to Skippers, Helmspeople and boat owners: if you want to race, make sure you enter! And please don't leave it till the day before the commencement of the series. There are several manual steps that take place behind the scenes. So, you need to enter your boat well ahead of time, ideally a week in advance or more.

Good luck to all crews participating in the 2025 Women's Helm Series.

Saturday Sailing

Saturday sailing continues to be a challenge at GFS with only small fleets. However, the regular participants enjoy close competitive racing in good spirit. A good gathering of sailors on the 'Deck of Knowledge' post-race dissects the day's events in a convivial manner over a couple of drinks.

The Saturday Overall series which includes Spring and Autumn series is sailed in two divisions. Division 1 with Etchells and faster yachts (Twilight Gold, Green, Blue type yachts) and Division 2 (Twilight Orange and White type



yachts). The Saturday Summer Series is separate and has a similar arrangement of yachts. Once a month there is a Mick York Series race held concurrently with a normal Saturday race.

The Saturday Down Harbour Series comprises three divisions which sail different down harbour courses starting from the GFS club. Blue division has faster yachts, White division Etchells and Orange division smaller yachts. Down Harbour races are mostly the second Saturday each month during the sailing season.

The Spring Series has been completed and the placings are shown on the following page.

There is always room for more entries to race on a Saturday. Although spinnakers are allowed they are not compulsory. Courses are different to Twilight courses and distances are set to suit the yachts in each fleet.
